Dear partners in Christ’s work,

This spring I placed our A-frame signs out on the sidewalk to advertise Vacation Bible School, but within a couple days a passerby had left a message on one of them. It was a large paper sticker with words handwritten in black permanent marker: “God doesn’t exist.”

We got the sign cleaned up and back on display rather quickly, but the incident stuck with me. Maybe there was nothing more to it than casual vandalism—but then again. There’s a certain amount of feeling behind a message like that. Those are not the words of someone who’s apathetic. In fact, you might think of these words as the start of a conversation.

Most of us have engaged in that conversation from time to time, giving voice to our faith in the face of skepticism. Scripture encourages us to: *Be ready at all times to answer anyone who asks you to explain the hope you have in you, but do it with gentleness and respect* (1 Peter 3:15-16). When we are open to it, we find many opportunities to speak openly of what our faith means to us. We never know how God will use our willingness and our words, imperfect as those words may seem. We never know who needs that word of encouragement.

At our Sunday Parkways outreach tent in July, we gave out over 200 free water bottles and had a number of friendly conversations with walkers and bikers. We learned that many people truly find encouragement from our involvement in the neighborhood. One man spoke of how it lifts him up to hear our bell ring out each Sunday morning. Another neighbor had occasion to call the church office regarding a property matter, and he mentioned that he and his family truly appreciate First Immanuel’s presence and all it does for its Northwest neighbors.

We represent God’s great gift of love for the world.

Every aspect of the witness we give is a reminder to people that God loves this world and is actively involved with it at all times. That God has not only brought this world into being, but God will see it through to completion on the day when God finally gathers all creation together in triumphant love. Some people may reject the witness, but we keep on extending it with humility and grace.

I’m looking forward to Rally Day on September 11, which is kind of like homecoming for the church. After being scattered for the summer, we come together again to kick off another year of learning and service and being strengthened in our life together, another year of making God’s great gift of love known in every way we can. I look forward to seeing you there.

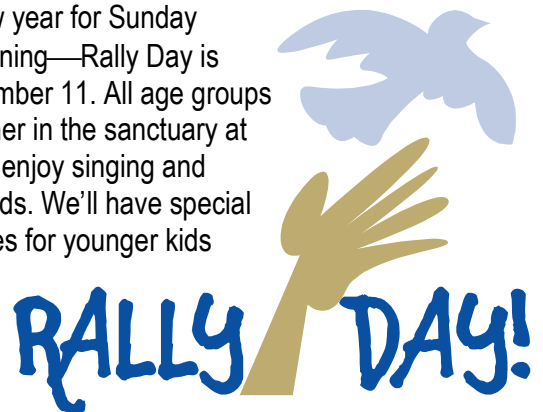

Read through the New Testament this Year!



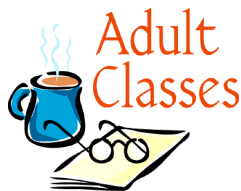

DIETRICH BONHOEFFER: Pastor, Martyr, Prophet, Spy

This fall we'll explore the life and wisdom of Dietrich Bonhoeffer, the German Lutheran pastor and theologian who acted boldly against the Nazi regime and finally gave his life in the cause. We'll explore his life through video and sample his writings, including excerpts from his two most famous books. *Life Together* addresses the values of Christian community, and *The Cost of Discipleship* applies Jesus' Sermon on the Mount to our lives. Sacred Space, Holy Things

Welcome to a new fall season at First Immanuel! In coming months, we will be featuring a new column in each newsletter, examining the physical space and worship objects that we can SEE with our eyes at First Immanuel. We'll examine many items—our stained glass windows, our pulpit, our altar, and many areas throughout the church you may not have really noticed. We hope to enhance your worship experience, and encourage a “second look” at items or objects in our beautiful church.

The building itself as a symbol: You may have never thought about this—when you sit in the sanctuary looking toward the altar, in what direction are you looking? If you answered “East,” you're correct. If you answered “towards Jerusalem,” you are also correct. The architects who laid out the plans for First Immanuel did not just aim “to fit the block” but rather followed a longstanding tradition of churches facing Jerusalem; in the Western world, that means facing the East. Almost all the great cathedrals in Europe face East. And most synagogues, such as our neighbor Temple Beth Israel, face Jerusalem. (There are, of course, exceptions—and in Portland, these have mainly to do with limited land rather than any symbolic virtue.)

The basic architectural layout of a Christian church is usually in the form of a Cross, with the longest part being called the nave. “Nave” sounds a lot like “naval,” and for good reason—the idea is that we are sitting in a boat—and not just any boat, but Christ's boat. We look EAST to the Holy City of Jerusalem (and also to the symbolic City of Heaven), and we sit in a structure shaped like the very Cross our Lord died upon. In front of the nave is an area called the crossing; in front of that is the chancel, with the transepts at each side. In the older Catholic tradition (until the 1960s' 2nd Vatican Council), the priests, choir, etc., all “inhabited” the chancel area and faced the altar in the East. In an effort to better involve the congregation, Protestant churches changed this orientation so that, while the congregation looks EAST, the ministers and worship leaders look WEST at the congregation—and out into the world.

So now, when you sit in church, think about the idea that you are really sitting in Christ's boat (the nave) and that you are safe from the storms on the sea. As you look up, realize that you are looking at Christ's cross, symbolizing Christ's love for you. And when you look ahead, remember you are looking East towards the Holy City.

As the Advent hymn says, “People, look East!”

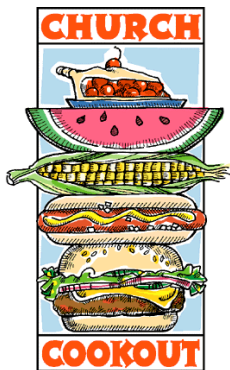

SUPPORT OUR NWPM FOOD PANTRY

Did you know that **NW Portland Ministries** provides food for over 900 low-income residents each month? The **Emergency Food Pantry** is open two days a week on the lower level of FILC's Sodergren Hall. **Harvest Share** provides fresh produce once a month. The **Home Delivery Program** takes food boxes to homebound neighbors. The **Food for Kids Backpack Program** provides weekly weekend food for Chapman Grade School children and their families living in transitional housing. Because we are **affiliated with the Oregon Food Bank**, your cash donations purchase food at greatly reduced rates.



Help fill up the food bin by the main church entrance, or place monetary gifts in the offering, clearly marked for NWPM food programs. The following items are particularly needed. Thanks for your help!

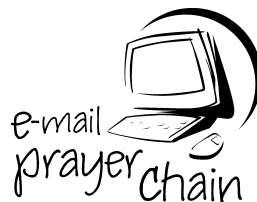
